Greenwich-Mohawk Brownfield Site Update - by Rob Adlam

Last year Brantford City Council, at the request of its Brownfield Community Advisory Committee, commissioned studies of three buildings on the former Massey site on Greenwich St. as well as the remaining Cockshutt Office, Warehouse, and Timekeeper's building on Mohawk St. The studies assessed heritage value, structural integrity, and designated substances still to be removed from these buildings.

The final reports were received back in February 2012 and the findings suggested that, with the exception of the warehouse section, both the Cockshutt Office and Timekeeper's building were good prospects for adaptive reuse. To view these reports

Council was set to deliver a final decision on the future of these structures by the end of April; however, a major fire of suspicious origin took place in the warehouse and office buildings on March 30^{th} . As a result of the fire, the warehouse section has now been demolished and the office has suffered both fire and water damage. On April 10^{th} , Council will consider three options regarding the future of the Cockshutt buildings, ranging from a more detailed engineering report and stabilization efforts, to demolition of the office and retention of the Timekeeper's building, or demolition of all buildings.

An Atypical Canadian

Albert Horsley a.k.a Harry Orchard, an unassuming prevaricator, philanderer, bomb maker and hired assassin from Brighton, Ontario, career climaxed in 1907 in Boise, Idaho. Harry's specialty was the dynamiting of mining plants, mine operators and scab labourers hired by mining companies that were strike-bound by the infamous Western Federation of Miners.

Harry's career came to an abrupt end when he was sentenced to hang for the assassination of the Governor of Idaho. Harry's sentence was subsequently commuted to life in prison where he died. Harry was a model prisoner and developed a platonic relationship with the late governor's widow. To this day, no one knows for sure how many victims were dispatched by Harry. The 1907 trial in Boise was the trail of the century and involved Clarence Darrow for the defence of Harry's alleged employers.

Marc Laferriere on why he joined the CIHC





Retracing Brock's War of 1812 Route



On August 5, 1812, two hundred years ago, General Isaac Brock prorogued the Legislature of Upper Canada, and left York [present day Toronto], sailed to the Head of the Lake [Hamilton] and marched overland to what is now Port Dover. He and his men left Dover on the 8th, and



rowed to Amherstberg, landing on the 13th. Brock took Fort Detroit on the 16th, winning the Michigan Territory from the Americans and re-taking the western frontier. The trail system you are on, comes very close to re-tracing Brock's Route. For further information, check out "brocksroute.com".
